Kingsley Elementary officially has an art class. Ms. Hannah Rose, a recent graduate of the prestigious Savannah College of Art and Design, is the new teacher behind Art on a Cart, a mobile learning experience that brings art into every classroom.

"It's really exciting and really fun. These students have never had an art class before, so they're totally blank canvases if you will. They're like sponges because they've never been exposed to some of the information, techniques, and materials of the projects," said Ms. Rose.


On October 10, Ms. Rose visited Mrs. Hoffman's third graders to teach them about the Pop Art movement. Students colored sketchbooks inspired by Roy Lichtenstein's *Crying Girl* pieces.

"Normally, we talk a lot in the sketchbook time about the artists that made that piece," said Ms. Rose. "To my surprise, they really love learning about the art history, and things like how much the piece weighs, how much it was worth, and what it's made out of. Those are things that I never thought we would have discussions about."

"My overall goal is to get as much information in their heads as they will let me. I'm super passionate about teaching kids the value of art and design. I'm specifically super passionate about how those skills can be transformed and translated into anything and everything when they move on and go to middle school and high school."

Kaylee Weber Publishes First Novel,

Goodbye Justice



Kingsley High School senior Kaylee Weber is a multi-hyphenate: she's a Cross Country runner, Drama Club member, and busy student balancing her extra-curriculars with an AP class load. Now, she has a new title to add to her name: published author.

Kaylee published her first novel, a mystery, *Goodbye Justice*, this fall. It's on sale now on Amazon and will be available at Barnes & Noble and other local bookstores soon.

The book, Kaylee says, was inspired by one she read in her freshman year English class.

"We read *To Kill a Mockingbird*, and it immediately became my favorite book of all time," said Kaylee. "I was like, 'I feel like I could write a book like that'. And so I kind of did, and that's when I first started it was the spring of my freshman year."

With all of her classes and activities, she found it hard to find time to start and finish a book. But she found the space she needed during the pandemic.

"During COVID we had long lunch periods and I'd get bored because we had so much time. So I guess I was like Goodbye Justice takes place in the early 1950's in a small, fictional town, in northern Georgia. It accounts the harrowing, controversial murders of residents of the town divided by railroad tracks and stricken with judgment. Recent law graduate, Mary Grey, as well as hot-shot prosecutor, David Bullbarrow, and Sheriff Martwain Dukes must work together to uncover the chilling truth that people aren't always as they seem."

'I'm just going to write a book.' That was the first one I ever finished. It was a huge confidence boost," said Kaylee.

Over the past four years, Kaylee has cranked out Goodbye Justice plus two sequels and a spin-off taking place in the 1950s and 60s. Right now, she's revisiting each book to do some re-writes.

"Now that I'm working on my second book, it's kind of hard because it's a mystery and there's a lot of really tiny details that I have to keep track of. It's very hard to not have the whole book planned out," said Kaylee. "I kind of just write and see what happens." "This has been the past four years of my life. It's finally out into the world and it's definitely very surreal."

In fourth grade, Kaylee's teacher told her that one day she'd be an author because she was always making up stories. Today, she aspires to be an author and high school English teacher.

"I think that the two work perfectly together. I have hundreds of book ideas that I want to write."

The senior plans to attend Central Michigan University next fall.



Kingsley Area Schools Launches New Strategic Planning Process; Seeks Community Input

On October 17, the Kingsley Area Schools Board of Education and the Administration announced the launch of a new initiative to guide them through a three- to five-year Strategic Plan. The process will include community and staff input events, data collection, and other efforts to create a shared vision and goals for the future of the district and strategies to achieve them, all while using scarce public education resources in the most effective and efficient way.

Stakeholder feedback will be an important part of the planning process. Community members, parents, students, teachers and all district staff members will have the opportunity to give input on the of the opportunities strengths district, for improvement, barriers for implementation, and their vision for the district.

Stakeholder input, along with essential district data, provides the basis for the district to choose approximately five priority goals to be implemented over the next three to five years.

The benefits of the strategic planning process are many. Most notable are:

- · Provides integrated, important input from community and staff
- Presents a succinct and graphical picture of the district's current status
- Sets focused strategic goals that identify target areas to improve student achievement
- Clearly delineates the role of the Board of Education and the superintendent/staff in strategic planning
- · Uses data to set goals and make important decisions
- · Helps identify areas to allocate increasingly scarce resources
- Aligns Board priorities with school improvement processes

Tony Temple, the Kingsley Area Schools Board of Education President stated, "As school board members, we have to make the best decisions in these challenging, changing times. It is essential we use data forecasting and stakeholder input to make decisions and set shared priorities for the future of our district."

Penny Kentish McWilliams, Ed.S., Consultant with the Michigan Association of School Boards, will work with Kingsley Area Schools for the next three months to complete the strategic plan. McWilliams said, Kingsley Area Schools and MASB have worked together to design a customized process that ensures broad stakeholder involvement and will result in an effective strategic plan implementation. We look forward to involving the community in this process."
