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


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JOSHUA ROTHWELL SELECTED AS NEW SUPERINTENDENT OF KINGSLEY AREA SCHOOLS



The Kingsley Area Schools Board of Education unanimously approved a resolution to begin contract negotiations with Mr. Joshua Rothwell to serve as the district's Superintendent of Schools. Mr. Rothwell is currently the Superintendent of Schools for Forest Area Schools.

There were twenty-five applicants for the position. A first round of interviews was conducted with four candidates on August 14 and August 15, 2023. Two final candidates were brought back to the district for afternoon tours and open houses followed by final interviews on August 25, 2023.

Written feedback was collected from the public who attended the open house sessions. Written feedback was also collected from the public after each candidate's interview. The feedback from both the open house sessions as well as both interviews was reviewed by school board members prior to their deliberations.

While the board affirmed the strengths of both the final candidates, it was a motion to enter contract negotiations with Mr. Rothwell that received unanimous support from the board.

The board hopes to come to a contract agreement with Mr. Rothwell quickly. When the board meets to approve a contract with Mr. Rothwell, his hiring as the next Superintendent of Schools for Kingsley Area Schools will be official.

A start date for Mr. Rothwell to begin his new position will be a part of the contract negotiations. Jason Stowe will serve as Interim Superintendent through October 9, 2023.

The Michigan Association of School Boards assisted the Kingsley Area School District with its superintendent search process.

As of press time, no decision regarding employment of the superintendent will be final until the board approves a contract with Mr. Joshua Rothwell.

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Bus Driver Shortage Prompts Changes to AM and PM Student Transportation



Due to the bus driver shortage, there are some changes being implemented to the transportation of your student for the 2023/24 school year.

AM Bussing

The CAT bus will run its normal route arriving at the middle school/elementary at 7:50 am.

Middle school and elementary students will unload from the bus and be taken to the Middle School, where they will be supervised. (High school students will remain on the bus).

At 7:54 am, the CAT Shuttle bus will arrive at Cherrywood Village to load. Students must be at the bus stop in a line ready to load in an orderly manner.

The bus will then depart and head to Pitter Patter and then the depot stop behind the KI.

After that, the bus will head to the high school to unload ALL High school students (both Cat and shuttle run).

Next, the bus will head to the middle school/elementary and unload the remaining students.

Students riding the shuttle will arrive at the middle/elementary schools in time to still get breakfast.

PM Bussing

At 3:15 pm, all shuttle students will board the CAT bus. Regular CAT bus students (elementary, middle, high school students) will be staged at their respective buildings under adult supervision until the shuttle run is complete.

At 3:30 pm, the bus will arrive at Cherrywood Village. Parents must be at the bus stop for its arrival. The bus will not be able to wait for late parents; please plan ahead. (Riding the bus is a privilege).

Next, the bus will stop at Pitter Patter and the depot stop behind the KI.

At 3:40 pm, the shuttle will return to the middle school to pick up all CAT bus students and run its normal route.

Meet Kingsley's New Assistant Principals

Last semester, Kingsley Area Schools' Administrative team identified the need for additional support at the middle and high school. The two-person leadership teams will allow both schools to invest more time in positive behavior measures, supporting teachers, and trying new things.



John Arnold: Assistant Middle School Principal

"I am excited to get in and mix it up with kids. I love engaging students and being that positive presence for them.

Mr. Arnold comes to the district with years of administrative, teaching, and coaching experience in various districts in Michigan, including Kalkaska most recently, as well as in Florida.

His role will be focused on creating a culture of positive behavior and facilitating parent communications.

"I'm going to be very visible in and around the building, just modeling and encouraging kids to use positive behavior, be good to each other, and be kind to each other."

Principal Heather Miller said the district administration team identified the need for additional support last semester.

"If a teacher writes a referral, or if students are having behavior struggles, John is going to be their number one person that they're going to be seeing," said Principal Miller.

Principal Miller will focus on teaching evaluations, providing instructional feedback, and supporting the teachers overall.

"My focus will shift more to being an instructional leader, which is what I was hired to do. I will help improve proficiency in our different core content areas," said Principal Miller.

Principal Miller says Mr. Arnold's best quality is his patience.

"He does a great job of sitting and listening to what's going on and thinking things through before jumping right into something. His patience is coupled with thoughtfulness so that he can help in the best way possible," said Principal Miller.

"He's down to earth, too. When he was here just for his interview and was walking the campus, the kids were naturally drawn to him. You know, he's 6'7" so he's definitely a presence! He's very relatable to kids and you could already see that the demeanor that he had with the kids was very positive."



Cody Wagatha: Assistant High School Principal

"I feel like Kingsley is one of the premier districts in Northern Michigan. I've wanted to work here for a long time."

Originally from Mesick, Mr. Wagatha's ties to the area and his specific interest in working in Kingsley made him stand out from other applicants, says Principal Chris Rapes.

"He wanted to come here. He said 'I want to come to Kingsley, I know I want to come to Kingsley, and I'm not looking anywhere else," said Principal Rapes. "We're getting somebody that's passionate to be here, and passionate to stay here."

Mr. Wagatha comes to KHS with nearly a decade of teaching experience at Pine River schools. He most recently worked at the middle school level and he's excited to return to working with high school students.

"At this age, their sense of humor is really developing and they're becoming who they're going to be. They're becoming young men and women and it's just fun to be a part of a big change," said Mr. Wagatha.

As assistant principal, he will be helping with teacher evaluations and supporting positive behavior initiatives.

"I'm here to help kids and to support the teachers, to help them have what they need to do their job because I think we're in a really good spot to have a great year," said Mr. Wagatha.

"Cody is going to be an active part of the admin team. I don't view the assistant principal role here as an assistant, we are going to be co-administrators," said Principal Rapes.

Principal Rapes says he'd love to start a mentoring program in the school, and having a two-person admin team will allow him time to build it.

"We brought somebody in that's a great fit. He complements my weak areas. I hope that families know that his perspective makes us better," said Principal Rapes.

GT Sherriff's Deputy Jason Roelofs joins Kingsley Area Schools as Resource Officer



Jason Roelofs has been a longtime fixture in Kingsley Area Schools. He's a parent to three Kingsley graduates and one current student, he's coached multiple teams over the years, and he's married to a Kingsley teacher.

This school year, he's taking on a new role in the district as the new School Resource Officer.

In mid-July, Grand Traverse County commissioners approved funding for the position, and Sherriff's Deputy Roelofs was hand-picked for the job.

"I'm excited to just be there for the kids," said Deputy Roelofs. "School safety will be my number one priority. But part of this job will not be law enforcement-related, it will be getting into classrooms, being a mentor, and being available for kids to talk to."

Deputy Roelofs will have an office at the high school but will rotate between all three schools.

"[He] will work to do all those things that a social worker is able to do. But then they also provide some of that school protection, some of the, you know, stiffening of a school because it's such a soft target," Superintendent Brad Reyburn said to 7&4 News in an interview.

"So it's really nice to have a person who can be the presence of helping with the social aspects of truancy and some of the social issues that our students are struggling with right now and then also being just that presence in the school that deters some negative activities."

Deputy Roelofs previously served as the School Resource Officer at KAS between 2006-2010, and he's excited to start and end his days at the school once again.

"I want the kids and parents to know that I have an open-door policy. If they have an issue and they want to talk, feel free to reach out to me," he said.

Deputy Roelofs has already started the transition to his new role and students will see him on their first day of school.

Middle School Travel Club Visits London, Paris in Second Annual Summer Trip

When a group of spirited middle school students embarked on a European adventure to London and Paris, they were not only met with iconic landmarks and cultural treasures, but also an exceptional tour director named Maciej. From the bustling streets of London to the romantic charm of Paris, this travel club's journey became an unforgettable experience of discovery, learning, and fun where history, art, and architecture came alive.



As we touched down at Heathrow Airport, excitement filled the air. Led by our expert tour director, we took an introductory walking tour of London. Our adventure began with the promise of days filled with history, art, food, and adventure.

e London, UK

An unexpected highlight came in the form of a royal parade with King Charles riding a horse, adding a touch of regal enchantment to our journey.

We explored the Natural History Museum and the Victoria & Albert Museum, and toured past the majestic Big Ben and the Houses of Parliament. Next was a whirlwind tour through Piccadilly Circus. That day, we viewed St. Paul's Cathedral, Buckingham Palace, and the venerable Westminster Abbey.

Later, the London Eye then gave us a completely different view of the city, allowing us to see all of London's boroughs.

Paris, France

Our journey commenced with a guided tour showcasing the city's most iconic landmarks, from the hubbub of **Place de la Concorde** to the elegance of **Champs-Élysées.** The group examined the **Arc de Triomphe** and learned of its history.

We then visited the mesmerizing palace and gardens of **Versailles**, a testament to opulence and artistic mastery. Guided by a local expert, we explored the **State Apartments** and were awestruck by the **Hall of Mirrors.**

Our Parisian exploration continued with another walking tour that took us past the **Notre Dame Cathedral.** We also immersed ourselves in art at the **Louvre**, toured **Montmartre**, and took in panoramic views of the **Sacre-Coer Basilicia**.

KAS Makes District-Wide Technology Upgrades



"We're bringing learning into the 21st century a little more. We are constantly working to make improvements to make things even better."

Kingsley Area Schools' technology department has been busy, squeezing years of tech upgrades and infrastructure maintenance into just a few months.

This summer, technology specialists Marcia Inman and Nik VanWagner are working to install new classroom and building equipment that will modernize Kingsley's classrooms, increase connectivity and strengthen building and cyber security.

<u>New Teacher Tech: laptops,</u> projectors, document cameras and docking stations

Marcia and Nik replaced all of the 10year-old desktops with sleeker computer systems and added laptops and docking stations to every classroom.

Each classroom now has upgraded projectors and document cameras.

"The laptops and docking stations will allow teachers to move their education environment to different places. They'll be able to take a class outside, or to the gym or library, while still staying connected and able to pull things up," said Nik. "Since the new projectors are everywhere, too, they can just take their computer and plug in somewhere else."

New Chromebooks

The district has invested in 400 new Chromebooks plus new Chromebook carts, so that every student will be able to use them during class time. Kindergarteners will be provided with special touchscreen versions.

<u>New Security Systems & Cameras</u> 125 new security cameras were installed at all three schools plus the Central Office, transportation department, and athletic fields.

Last fall, the district also implemented a buzz-in security system at every school door. Community members, parents, and students, now have to use a camera doorbell admittance system to gain admittance.

New Network Infrastructure and Security

The district's old hardware made it impossible to upgrade to the latest software, including advanced security and anti-virus protection. Now that all of the computers are being replaced, Kingsley Area Schools will have state-of-the-art systems and security.

"Now, we've got a new firewall that sits at the edge of our network and kind of monitors everything that goes in and comes or comes out," said Marcia.

Expanded WiFi Coverage

New WiFi access points have been added across campus.

"It has longer and better coverage and can support more devices at one time. If teachers want to take their class outside, they'll still get WiFi," said Nik VanWagner.

New iPads for Kindergarten

This year, every Kindergarten room will have six iPads available plus touchscreen Chromebooks.

New Academic Digital Streaming Service

Teachers and students will now be able to access Swank Digital Campus,

an online streaming platform with a catalog of 35,000 movie titles for use in the classroom and school.

A New Face

New technology specialist and 2022 Kingsley High School graduate Nik VanWagner joined the IT department full-time in Spring 2023, but he has been training for his role for a long time.

"In high school, I was the 'call-himbefore-calling-the-tech-guy' student for a while. A few teachers, if they had a problem, knew my schedule and they'd call my teacher and say 'Hey, can you send him down here to fix this?'"

Nik interned with the school's tech team last year and was later offered a full-time role.

"I like waking up every morning and saying okay, this is what I'm going to change today, or, this is what I'm going to make better today. I also like being here full-time because school wasn't my strong point or anything, but I liked the people here,"

Marcia and Nik would like to thank everyone for their patience and support in installing and implementing the new systems.

"All of this would not be possible without the support of Northwest Education services and the supportive administration and staff at Kingsley Area Schools."

- Instructional support (staff, supplies & materials, etc.)
- Non-instructional services (counseling, social work, health services, etc.)
- Professional Learning for staff
- Parent and Community engagement supplies and activities
- Technology
