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




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KINGSLEY MIDDLE SCHOOL SECRETARY KAY WAGNER TO RETIRE AFTER 43 YEARS IN THE DISTRICT



For 30 years, Mrs. Kay Wagner has been the first friendly face that students, staff, and families see when they walk through the doors of Kingsley Middle School. This will be her final school year in the front office as she plans to retire in June 2023.

"I have, kind of, mixed feelings, because I've been here so long, and it's like part of my family," she said.

Mrs. Wagner has become family to many in the district over the years, serving students as a librarian, reading aide, and secretary since starting with the schools 43 years ago.

"I started in 1978. The superintendent came in and said, 'you're going to be the elementary librarian.' And I argued with him and told him I didn't have any training. Well, I took a class up at the college and I took a class through the state of Michigan for the Library Association, and I got the library background," said Mrs. Wagner. "Then one day, the superintendent came into the library while I was reading to the small children and he said 'Hmm, see, I told you, you could do it!' and he walked out."

Over the years, Mrs. Wagner has seen the district grow from a one-building campus to a class B school system with 1,500 students.

She says this time feels right to move on to her next chapter. Story continued on page 2.

KMS Secretary Mrs. Kay Wagner Reflects on 43 Years of Service to Kingsley Area Schools

"I have three children, and they all live out of state. Two of them have brand new homes and I'd like to visit them. I think they were probably my biggest concern," said Mrs. Wagner. "I don't know what retirement will look like, exactly, it's kind of up in the air. So I just take each day at a time."

"I think I would like to go and read books or help somebody read, like a mentor. I would like to go out there and volunteer."

"I think my favorite part of the job is watching these kids grow from adolescence to young people that are ready to go on to high school. Very nice," said Mrs. Wagner. "This age group...they're halfway between wanting to be babies to being adults. It's a challenge."

As the secretary, Mrs. Wagner serves many roles: administrative assistant, attendance line, pupil counting, and immunization compliance through the state.

Unofficially, Mrs. Wagner also serves as the makeshift nurse and counselor to heal boo-boos and offer a listening ear.

"I'll answer the phone and take care of bloody noses, I've had a couple of broken arms, and then the phone rings while you're trying to do that, and meanwhile you've got somebody in front of you looking at you in the face that you need to get back to," said Mrs. Wagner.

"I guess I've been here so long that I can answer the phone and give out medicine and write excuses for kids and be able to handle all of it at once."

"I don't think the community realizes all the things I do. Because there's a lot of kids that come in in the morning and they got a heavy heart or something like that. And I've had a lot of people come in and tell me things that they probably shouldn't. But I always have a listening ear."

She says the school and its staff have also helped her through difficult times.

"I lost my husband a couple of years ago and I think that's probably what's kept me afloat, it was I had like a second family here," she said. "Now, I'm going to run our farm just like he would want me to do."

She also learned that in the 1960's, the average age for a woman to marry was 20 years old, compared to a current average of 27-28. Layla Hickerson (top right) and her partner Cheri talked about how family dynamics have changed over the years; and how in the 60s, it was expected that women would stay home and care for the family and house while men worked and earned a living. All of the seniors and their partners enjoyed this intergenerational project and opportunity to learn from one another.



Meet Band Director Lance Dubay

Mr. Dubay grew up in Petoskey and studied music at Northern Michigan University.

"In college, I was by no means a great tuba player or a great musician. I struggled so hard, which I think is why I've been able to be successful. I have literally lived every struggle with performing."

Mr. Dubay joined Kingsley Area Schools in 2018 after the departure of longtime band director Tom Clair. Since day one, his goal has been to grow the program and get more kids involved in band.

"Growing up, I was in band and had a not-so-good home life. Music was my outlet. I try to make sure kids know that it can be an outlet. Music is really secondary. My goal is to make good, productive members of society.

It's about hard work, honoring commitments, and being held to a higher standard, which is important in all things you do."

Mr. Dubay is finishing his master's education. specifically pedagogy. He has been recruited for a few PhD programs and says he wants to continue his education because "we need more band directors. I want to be the one to help produce the next generation of good band directors."

In the summer, he instructs at Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp. He also does a lot of writing and arranging. He's currently working on piecing together works from American composer Percy Grainger.

"I get bored if I'm not busy. I will have time to rest when I'm dead."



Meet Choir Director Andy Evans

Kingsley Choir Director Andy Evans grew up surrounded by music.

"My mom was the choir director for 30 years at the Leland United Methodist Church. From the time I was a year old, they were passing baby around rehearsals, and as my siblings and I grew up, we were part of the adult choir."

He began his musical career as a vocal major in college before switching to upright bass.

Eventually, professors his starting passing gigs to him, and that's when his rockstar era began: Mr. Evans spent many years touring including in parts of South Korea, and he rubbed shoulders with big name musicians while living in Nashville.

But it was a musician from Randy Travis' touring band who led Mr. Evans to a teaching career.

"The fiddle player from Randy Travis's road band and I worked together a lot. His wife was one of the top public school orchestra directors in Nashville. She always told me 'you need to be a teacher!' and she would have me go and do workshops with her students."

He found a job as an orchestra director in Metro Nashville. Three years later, he moved to Northern Michigan with his family.

The rest, as they say, is history. Today, Mr. Evans is celebrating 20 years as the choir director at Kingsley Area Schools.

"I love my choir. This is just the most amazing group of kids."

Teacher Feature: Meet the 7th Grade Team



"We're their biggest cheerleaders. We have to encourage them while they're trying to figure out who they are. It's so easy to lean toward the negative parts of themselves, and we are the ones always fighting to convince them that they are good enough."

Seventh graders are smack dab in the middle of everything: they're trying to figure out who they are while also beginning to think about their futures.

It's also a foundational grade where they learn skills like basic math and reading comprehension techniques that they'll rely on for the rest of their lives.

"It's an equal mix of being prepared for eighth grade, which really prepares them for high school, and they're already thinking about their futures," said math teacher Stacie Jankiewicz.

Seventh grade traditions include a field trip to the Sleeping Bear Dunes and career explorations and experiences.

"It's a year of significant physical and social and academic growth. It's awesome to watch them grow confident in their abilities because they can do things that they didn't realize they could do," said ELA teacher Lisa Flees.

Read on to learn about the teachers and lessons of 7th grade!

Andrew Sias - History

"We go from prehistory up through the end of the Western Roman Empire. As we go through each of those eras, we look at them through the lens of the four main social studies disciplines; history, geography, economics, and civics. By the end of the year, I have them design a society for a colony on another planet. We look at it from all perspectives, like what is the economy like, what kinds of jobs are there, what is the government system, etc. I want them to be able to apply the skills that they've learned throughout the year on that final project."

<u>Lisa Flees - ELA</u>

"We do a lot of analyzing, thinking, and inference-making. We do some writing, grammar, and some argument. We read A Long Walk to Water, which is centered in South Sudan during the Sudanese War where the last boys and girls had to flee and seek out refugee camps and many of them ended up going and living in the US," said Mrs. Flees.

Lori Nolf - Science

"I teach physical science. It's an introduction to chemistry and physics. The whole beginning of the year is a lot with chemical interactions and chemical changes, and then the second half of the year, it's all the physical science. So kinetic energy, gravity, magnetism, electricity, waves, wave energy, how things move or don't move. It's a lot of hands-on labs, which the kids like."

Stacie Jankewicz - Math

"This math class has the transferable skills that they need. Everybody needs seventh grade math. For example, can you go to Home Depot and figure out the square footage or make a conversion if the flooring comes in square inches or something like that? Or understanding unit pricing, or knowing how much when something costs they're is a percentage off at the store. I could go on all day."

Kingsley Seniors, 8th Graders visit School's Wilderness Property for Annual Science Day







On Friday, May 19, Kingsley 8th graders and seniors visited the school's 500-acre wilderness property for a hands-on science lesson in a real-life setting!

The 6th Annual Science Day, organized by science teachers Tiffany Smith and Boone Scharp, offers students an opportunity to see their lessons come to life as they hone in on their powers of observation and discovery while utilizing their practical skills.

8th graders rotated through nine stations across the property that were set up and hosted by senior wilderness students.

Activities included water quality testing, studying macroinvertebrate species, fire-building, survival bracelet making, teambuilding, bluebird house observations, shelter building, geocaching, and balloon launching.
