



Preschool Application Now Available for 2026-2027



4-year-olds will Apply for GSRP: Free State Funded Preschool

To apply for a GSRP slot, parents will need to email Kristin Goethals at kgoethals@kingsleyschools.org or go to NMCAA.net to set up an appointment and indicate Kingsley Preschool Program as their first choice of schools.

The appointments are done in collaboration with NMCAA for Kingsley GSRP and Hannah Headstart slots. The GSRP slots are for students who are four years old by September 1st 2026. GSRP slots will first be offered to qualifying at-risk families based on a series of risk factors including low family income and then to other families.

Families qualifying for GSRP after their appointment will be asked to designate a first choice and second choice of program locations. Students may also be offered a Hannah Headstart slot if they qualify. The state qualifies students through June and acceptance letters are mailed at that time.

Hours of operation are 8:30-3:15 Monday through Thursday. ALL students who will be four need to complete this application due to the state language around universal preschool.



3-year-olds will Apply for Tuition Preschool

The tuition-based program is open to any family whose child is 30 months of age up to school age, and is potty trained, and will first be filled with three-year-olds.

There are no income qualifiers to be accepted into the program, and the cost is \$36 per day (for the 2025-26 year, subject to change). The \$36 per day includes lunch, a morning snack, and an afternoon snack. Program options include Tuesday/Thursday, Monday/Wednesday/Friday, or Monday/Tuesday/Wednesday/Thursday/Friday. Space is limited.

If three-year-olds don't fill all the spaces we will fill in with four-year-olds. Filling out a pre-registration form does NOT guarantee enrollment. Letters will be mailed in May verifying acceptance. Hours of operation are 7:45 am to 3:45 pm.

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Kingsley Elementary is “Beating the Odds” in Reading

A new report from The 74, an education-focused news outlet, analyzed more than 10,000 districts across the country to find the schools that are helping their students read and succeed.

Kingsley Elementary is a notable bright spot – with data showing that third grade reading scores are much higher than expected for a school with similar demographics.

Their analysis compared reading scores and income levels from more than 40,000 individual schools to examine their predicted versus actual literacy rate.

Based on national comparisons with demographically similar schools, Kingsley Elementary was only expected to have a 43% reading proficiency rate. In reality, 70% of our third graders are reading at their grade level!

“Our teachers and staff work tirelessly to push students to reach their potential and we are not satisfied until each student is making gains,” said Principal Goethals. We believe that regardless of where students come from, they have the ability. We just have to figure out how to tap into it.”

According to the report, Kingsley Elementary is in the top 5% of schools nationwide in terms of reading success.

Kingsley Elementary hosts several reading events throughout the year, including Literacy Night which encourages parents and guardians to learn new ways to engage their children at home.

In March, the entire school celebrates Reading Month with all-school assemblies, guest readers, reading challenges, and spirit days to get students excited about books and learning.

We look forward to continuing this tradition and building on the success of this first historic evening.






8th Grade Visits USCG

STAGS RIDE THE HIGH AFTER GREATEST ATHLETIC SEASON IN RECENT MEMORY

2025 was a thrilling year to be a Stag fan: last fall, the Kingsley football and volleyball teams advanced to State Finals, with the Lady Stags securing the school's first ever state title, and the boys becoming State runner ups.



Sophomore cross country runner Tristan Hernandez earned first-team honors after becoming a D3 All-State finisher with a time of 16:15 at the MHSAA State Finals.

Female rugby players from Kingsley helped lead the Traverse City Alliance team to a State Championship matchup.

"The fall sports season was arguably the most successful season, certainly since I've been here, and probably in school history," said Athletic Director Mitch Miggengburg.



Another impressive accomplishment was made on the soccer pitch. The varsity boys team had their most successful season in recent memory.

"That story was unfortunately in the background because of our two other sports competing in state finals," said Mr. Miggengburg. "As recently as four years ago, they were 0-17, this year, they turned it around to win a playoff game and finish in the top half of our conference."

"John Vermilya joined as the new head coach this year and was able to turn things around quickly in a competitive league,"

He also acknowledged the contributions of previous coaches.

Through all the action, the Kingsley community and beyond stepped up to cheer on the Stags.

"We have unbelievable support anyways, regardless of if we're successful or not. But we see it on a bigger scale when we're on a run. People are taking notice not just in our community but in the surrounding areas. It's amazing to see the support."


