KINGSLEY RESEARCH STUDENTS IMPRESS AT PRESTIGIOUS FLINT REGIONAL SCIENCE & ENGINEERING FAIR



This Spring, Nancy Olenchek and six of her Kingsley High School research students headed to their first-ever science fair. All of them walked away with an award or honorable mention recognition!

Students competed at the prestigious Flint Regional Science & Engineering Fair. The annual exhibition was recognized as one of the best in the region by Nat Geo. It is also an affiliate of the International Science & Engineering Fair.

Junior Zachary Middleton was a fair finalist, taking 8th place overall for his research titled The baseball pitch and how spin rate affects vertical movement and velocity.

KHS teacher Wallace Hoffelt recently completed his degree in fisheries and wildlife, and is making the outdoors his classroom! By the end of the unit, Mr. Hoffelt's students will know how to measure trees, identify them, evaluate wood lots for invasive species, animal presence, and ground cover; as well as how to assess the market value of stands of trees. During a recent lesson, Mr. Hoffelt made an exciting discovery: He found what he believes to be the largest basswood tree in Michigan right behind KHS. "I was measuring the trees to get a baseline for class. This is potentially the biggest one in Michigan, ever. And if I get this confirmed, it may even be the 50th-largest tree in the state!"

Teachers, Students Brainstorm Ways to Continue Momentum after Challenge Day



In February, hundreds of middle and high school students participated in Challenge Day, an extensive workshop focused on building a school culture of acceptance, empathy, and connection.

The result, says KHS teacher Michelle Peterson, was connections built between peer groups and increased empathy across the school population.

Now, teachers and students are brainstorming ways to keep the momentum going. This semester, Mrs. Peterson and KMS counselor Olivia Bradford hosted a group of student stakeholders to pick their brains.

"We came up with a list four pages long of things that they want to see happen to keep our school culture or to change our school culture, to make people feel welcome in the building and in their classrooms," said Mrs. Peterson.

The list includes ideas like...

- -Putting conversation cards on lunch tables
- -Assigning mentors to freshmen
- -Creating safe spaces for students to use during times of feeling overwhelmed
- -Holding an all-school assembly on the first day of school
- -Adding more internal student recognition (birthdays, athletic and academic achievements, and more)
- -Implementing lessons about stress management and mindfulness into the school day
- -One-on-one teacher-student check-ins
- -Putting up posters with encouraging messages

Students and teachers alike expressed their interest in hosting Challenge Day or Challenge Day-like activities in the future.

"I think it could be more of a regular thing, where we get to get out our feelings and connect with people," said Mrs. Peterson. "I think if you can build that culture it can continue."



Jon Pearson: Jon is a senior on the varsity wrestling team and had an outstanding season for the Stags with a 31-13 overall record and finishing 6th in 132-lb weight class at the Division 3 MHSAA State Finals at Ford Field. Jon amassed 124 wins in his wrestling career at Kingsley and also excelled in football and track while carrying a 3.37 grade point average.



Gavyn Merchant: Gavyn is a senior on the varsity wrestling team and capped off an incredible wrestling career for the Stags with a 4th place finish in the 132-lb weight class at the Division 3 MHSAA State Finals at Ford Field. Gavyn amassed 138 career wins for the Stags winning four District titles, four Regional championships, and four All-State finishes. Gavyn was also an All Northern Michigan Football Conference quarterback leading Kingsley to a Division 6 State Championship while carrying a 3.47 grade point average.



Caleb Bott: Caleb is a senior on the varsity wrestling team and capped off his senior year as the Mid Michigan Conference Champion at 175 lbs and Division 3 District Runner-up. Recently, Caleb signed his letter of intent to play collegiate Rugby at Davenport University. He was also an All Northern Michigan Football Conference offensive lineman for the Division 6 State Championship-winning Stags while carrying a 3.69 grade point average.



KINGSLEY BAND AND CHOIR NOTES

Kingsley Bands had a busy February and March. On February 5, Kingsley hosted 900 students from 32 schools for the Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association District II Solo and Ensemble Festival. Kingsley Students pulled double duty as volunteers and performers. Several earned impressive I and II ratings.

State Solo and Ensemble was held in Cadillac on March 16. Emma Belanger and Kaylin Mitchell earned a I on their marimba duet, and the mixed quartet of Jonny, Sid, Tyler, and Levi also earned a I. Mara VanWagner, and Natalie Sterk earned a II on their double reed duet. The middle and high school bands also performed in the MSBOA District

Il Band and Orchestra Festival. They were evaluated across five categories playing music that director Lance Dubay says was "well beyond their years." Both groups of students earned I's from the judges.

On March 12, four middle school musicians participated in the MS-BOA District Honor Band, comparable to an all star team.

Middle school choir earned a first division rating at MSVMA district festival and will perform at State festival this spring. High school earned a second division rating at district festival.

District Adopts Strategic Plan Results; Identifies Core Goals

"I think the most exciting part is this strategic plan was built on the thoughts and ideas of our community, which is something that hasn't been done in a long time."

After months of community input sessions, planning retreats, and internal meetings, Kingsley's strategic planning process is complete. The Board of Education adopted the Michigan Association of School Boards' (MASB) summary results at the March 11 meeting.

Penny McWilliams from the MASB synthesized input from several hundred internal and community stakeholders to identify five key focus areas: Academics & Programs, Learning Environment & Culture, Communications & Community Engagement, Operations & Finance, and Personnel.

Within those focus areas are 15 objectives, which are listed below. District administrators, along with KAS's business manager Nadia Hoover further narrowed the list by identifying four objective focuses for this year. Those focus objectives are in bold:

Personnel

Goal Statement: Kingsley Area Schools will build trust through open communication, mutual respect, and collaboration to provide efficient operations that support success.

Objectives:

- •Develop guidelines and procedures for onboarding staff.
- •Attract and retain staff, teachers and administrators

"We want to provide a really comfortable work environment for everybody. In the last, probably, five years with COVID, and some other factors, people weren't super excited to come to work. We want a comfortable learning environment of collaboration. It's a culture effort," said Superintendent Rothwell.

Learning Environment & Culture
Goal Statement: Kingsley Area Schools
will be a safe and collaborative learning
environment for students and staff.

Objectives:

- •To execute Professional Learning Community (PLC) with fidelity.
- Acclimate new and current stakeholders to the Kingsley Area Schools community.

•Create a plan for Positive Behavior Intervention & Supports (PBIS) implementation districtwide.

Operations & Finance

Goal Statement: Kingsley Area Schools will be fiscally responsible in meeting the needs of students and staff through alignment with the Strategic Plan.

Objectives:

- Collaborate development of budget.
- •Develop methods to communicate department and building budgets.
- Monitor expenditures to ensure fiscal responsibility.
- •Evaluate growth to determine needs for future expansion.

Right now, Kingsley is undergoing a facilities study that will be finished the week of April 22. Superintendent Rothwell says the results of that study will help identify the greatest areas of need in terms of infrastructure. A future ballot initiative to fund these projects is something that will be considered.

Academics & Programs

Goal Statement: Kingsley Area schools will increase engagement and opportunities to enhance student achievement.

Objectives:

- •Provide time and opportunities for staff improvement.
- Align curriculum in grades K-12 to provide students a guaranteed viable curriculum.
- Utilize district and state data to identify trends and inform decision-making.

"Curriculum purchases over the last number of years have been very inconsistent. Right now, we're focused on aligning our language arts curriculum," said Superintendent Rothwell.

Communication & Community Engagement

Goal Statement: Kingsley Area Schools will consistently communicate to engage students, staff, parents and the community.

Objectives:

- •Implement intentional positive communication to celebrate success.
- •Create partnerships with local businesses and organizations to support the district.
- •Maintain and strengthen parental involvement in school community."

Board of Education Seeking Three Candidates for Upcoming Vacancies



Over the past four months, the board and administration came together to outline a three- to five year Strategic Plan. During this time, community members, students, staff, administrators and board members worked together to create new district goals and objectives, as well as a new mission and vision for our district.

President Vivien Snyder says,

"This is an opportune time for anyone who may be considering a board position with new goals in place for our district." Being an advocate for Kingsley Area Schools and public education at large is so important at this time.

Running for a board position should not be taken lightly. I will be honest, there is more time involved than a monthly meeting. The key to being a productive board member involves a few things: good listening skills, communicating with respect, being prepared to address agenda items, understanding the different roles of a board member and superintendent, becoming familiar with policy and procedures, and educating oneself on what is new and changing in the world of public education.

As board members, we all need to collectively work together and make the best decisions possible for the district. We are individuals but when the board speaks (votes) it is with one voice. Regardless of our individual position we support the decision as a whole moving forward. With that said, I find this is one of the most rewarding things I can do to give back to the students and the district. We have a great school with many moving parts that make it that way and I thank each and everyone of them."

This year, there will be three open seats on the Kingsley Board of Education. There are two full 6-year terms (ending in 2030) and one 2-year partial term (ending in 2026) on the November 5, 2024 ballot. Board president Vivien Snyder invites all interested community members to consider running for one of the positions.

Interested candidates must file with the County Clerk by July 23, 2024. Community members would vote for the new members in the November 2024 election and they would take office in January 2025.

11 Juniors Recognized for Outstanding Test Scores



Eleven juniors from Kingsley High School were recently acknowledged for their exceptional performance on the Practice SAT (PSAT) and National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT).

Their scores place them within the top 10% of the entire state of Michigan, representing rural populations and select demographic groups.

"I'm proud of them. This changes the trajectory of what their future looks like. These awards speak to their grit and their ability to see the opportunity to get a good education here and take advantage of that," said KHS Principal Chris Rapes.

These awards provide students with an opportunity to showcase their academic prowess to colleges and scholarship programs seeking diverse talent.

Congratulations to the following students, who are now eligible for awards in the following categories:

Madelyn Wares, National African American Recognition Program; Tyren Delk, National First-Generation Recognition Program; Mason Glazier, National First-Generation Recognition Program and National Rural and Small Town Recognition Program; Isabella Paroskie, National First-Generation Recognition Program; Korbin Bedford, National Indigenous Recognition Program and National Rural and Small Town Recognition Program; Other National and Small Town Recognition Program eligible students are Sayla Bender, Lucas Buning, Logan Face, Zachary Middleton, Nathan Peters, and Natalie Sterk.

These awards reflect not only the hard work and talent of the students but also the concerted effort of the entire district to improve test scores at Kingsley High School.

Last year, KHS science teacher Nancy Olenchek noted that neighboring schools with similar populations were outperforming Kingsley on the PSAT. She believed that her students' scores did not accurately reflect their potential.

She aggregated all of their individual test results to create a statistical model that painted a picture of what went wrong.

"I broke down the data by domain and analyzed the performance of each student. I realized that many of them lacked test-taking strategies," said Ms. Olenchek.

Ms. Olenchek discovered that some students struggled with time management, often missing easy points due to lack of strategy. She collaborated with math teacher Michelle Peterson, who had initiated a math intervention hour, to introduce additional test preparation programs. Along with teacher Robin Lewis, they implemented three programs aimed at familiarizing students with test formats and mastering content areas.

These programs include: In-class lessons on the PSAT's digital format, with Mrs. Lewis teaching students how to utilize the online graphing calculator for math and science sections. Weekly quizzes reviewing test content. A new math intervention hour to provide additional support and practice for small groups of students.

Additionally, academic counselor Lori Heitmeyer organized free PSAT prep workshops on Sundays this past winter.

The culmination of their efforts speaks for itself as practice test scores are already rising across the board.

"It validates all of the good things our teachers are doing. We have outstanding teachers. I can't tell you how many times I just walk into a classroom to tell them 'you're amazing, you're a rockstar' because it is incredible to work around people who are constantly trying to raise the bar." said Mr. Rapes.

These achievements not only celebrate the success of individual students but also highlight the commitment of Kingsley High School to academic excellence and student advancement.

2024-2025 Preschool Application

GSRP: Free State Funded Preschool

To apply for a GSRP slot parents will need to email Kristin Goethals at kgoethals@kingsleyschools.org or go to NMCAA.net to set up an appointment and indicate Kingsley Preschool Program as their first choice of schools. The appointments are done in collaboration with NMCAA for Kingsley GSRP and Hannah Headstart slots. The GSRP slots are for students who are four years old by September 1 st 2024. GSRP slots will be offered to qualifying at risk families based on a series of risk factors including low family income. Families qualifying for GSRP after their appointment will be asked to designate a first choice and second choice of program locations. Students may also be offered a Hannah Headstart slot if they qualify. The state qualifies students through June and acceptance letters are mailed at that time. Hours of operation are 8:30-3:15 Monday through Thursday with the option to add a paid day on Friday. (Limited spots) ALL students who will be 4 need to complete this application due to the state language around possible universal preschool for next year.

Tuition Preschool

The tuition based program is open to any family whose child is 30 months of age up to school age, and is potty trained. There are no income qualifiers to be accepted into the program, and the cost is \$33 per day (for the 2023-24 year, subject to change). The \$33 per day includes lunch, a morning snack, and an afternoon snack. Program options include Tuesday/Thursday, Monday/Wednesday/Friday, or Monday/Tuesday/Wednesday/Thursday/Friday. Space is limited. Filling out a preregistration form does NOT guarantee enrollment. Letters will be mailed in May verifying acceptance. Hours of operation are 7:45 am to 3:45 pm. 
