KINGSLEY HIGH SCHOOL NJROTC INVITED TO MARCH IN WASHINGTON DC'S MEMORIAL DAY PARADE

Kingsley High School's Naval Junior Officer's Reserve Training Corps (NJROTC) has been invited to march in the National Memorial Day Parade in Washington, D.C. on May 25, 2026.

Just one ROTC per state is invited.

Kingsley's 65 cadets are now fundraising to attend and participate in the nation's tribute to fallen veterans and the heroes who continue to serve our country.

The National Memorial Day Parade is a three hour procession that marches along the National Mall. The patriotic event features 10,000 people from all 50 states, commemorating service members from several wars and conflicts.

"This opportunity is a profound honor for our cadets. It represents not only a chance to stand in the nation's capital and pay tribute to those who have made the ultimate sacrifice, but also a moment of pride for our school, our families, and our state," said KHS instructor, Gunnery Sergeant Mathew Barr.

The cadets' Memorial Day Parade experience also includes guided tours of sites like Arlington NationalCemetery, the Washington Monument, Smithsonian Museums, and a concert from the National Symphony at the US Capitol.

Community Steps Up to Support Woodshop Class

This fall, Kingsley woodshop teacher Scott Morey put out a plea to the community: we need donations to keep the class free or low-cost for students.

The industrial arts elective was in desperate need of supplies - chiefly lumber - for students to continue their projects.

A Facebook post asking the community for donations was shared more than 200 times, reaching more than 20,000 people. The response was immediate and overwhelming: Mr. Morey was inundated with calls, voicemails, texts, emails from people interested in lending a hand.

Suddenly, community members and businesses started arriving with truckloads of lumber and tools. Then, the problem became finding a place to put it all.

"It's been amazing. It's a great feeling to know that parents, the community, and local businesses are so supportive of our kids," said Mr. Morey. "We are getting the program to where we need it to be."

Mr. Morey is still accepting small power tool donations and gift cards to Menards, where the district has a tax-exempt account.

"I am so appreciative for the community's support of this class. Woodshop is such an important class -- we all know there's a huge deficit in the trades.

Some may go into that field, but even if they're not, those skills are important in life, like when they become homeowners. It helps with critical thinking and problem solving. Thank you again to all of our donors."










Marching Band Performs at TC Expo
